Editorial

Spring is here and with it the season of AGMs and quiz nights and outdoor events to keep people busy through to summer. NoWar people have been busy this past month preparing for the [NoWar AGM on 11 October](#), developing the [Peace of the Action](#) radio program and taking stock of the best way to focus our energies. The poor turnout at the Time to Go! rally on 24 September suggests that people will really only turn out in numbers if there is a strong reason to do so. The Time to Go! rally was generated in the UK with the focus being the UK Labour Party Conference held in Manchester that weekend. At the same time, there was a week of action in the USA beginning that weekend, with over 400 groups holding events around the US. The people of the UK and US clearly feel the sting of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan far more than we do here in Australia, given the size of their forces committed to the invasions and the significant losses of military and other personnel they have had to endure. We hope that this is not necessary in our country for people to raise their voices in increasing opposition to these wars.

The radio program A Peace of the Action, broadcast on [Radio Adelaide, 101.5 FM](#) every Sunday at 12:30pm has been a great success. We have now completed five weekly broadcasts. A Peace of the Action is a joint initiative of five Adelaide peace and social justice groups including NoWar. Training for the next set of presenters is underway, so soon there will be a team of six people available to produce and broadcast this lively program that features comment, events and music on the themes of peace and social justice.

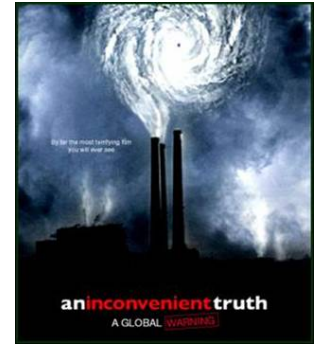

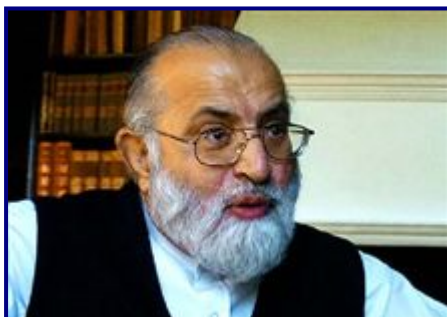
Why Terror? There is an alternative - Thursday 12 October at 7.45pm

Featured items

Pine Gap Four

"Certainly in relation to identifying specific targets, Pine Gap is important. The Pine Gap contribution (to the Iraq war) is much more significant than any sending of Australian soldiers" (Dr Michael McKinley, Strategic analyst at the ANU Canberra.)

At dawn on December 9, 2005 a Citizen's Inspection of Pine Gap took place causing Pine Gap to shut down for five hours. The reason? A group of four Christian pacifists had entered the base, seeking to expose the terrorist acts perpetrated from inside the base. [Christians Against ALL Terrorism](#) condemns terrorism in all its forms including the state terrorism behind the U.S and Australia's illegal invasion and occupation of Iraq and Afghanistan. In order to be morally consistent, we cannot distinguish between the terrorist acts of a suicide bomber in Baghdad, or of a U.S jet bomber in Fallujah. In both cases innocents are murdered and maimed for a political objective.

Jim Dowling, Adele Goldie, Bryan Law and Donna Mulhearn have been charged under the *Defence (Special Undertakings) Act, 1952*. The Act has not been used previously and carries a maximum jail sentence of 7 years, with an additional two years for taking photographs within the base. The four will appear in the Alice Springs Supreme Court in October.

Edward Cranswick, NoWar member and former Human Shield in Iraq wrote to NoWar of his plans to support the Pine Gap 4:

I am taking the train to Alice Springs to give support to the Pine Gap 4 and participate in demonstrations against Pine Gap, the largest US CIA/military intelligence base outside of the United States. The trial of the Pine Gap 4, which was originally scheduled for 3-13 October 2006 has now been effectively postponed till a later date. Donna ascribes the change in the government prosecution strategy to the recent offer of the noted jurist, Ron Merkel Q.C., to represent the Pine Gap 4, but I suspect that the Australian government has much larger concerns -- the last thing their master, the US government, wants is a high-publicity trial at Alice Springs and demonstrations at Pine Gap right at the time when the US is preparing to use Pine Gap to attack Iran, within the next month before the US Congressional elections on 7 November 2006. Pine Gap is where the US military forces communicate with the military satellites that are in geostationary orbits over the Middle East and from which they control the cruise missiles, smart bombs, etc., that have targeted Serbia, Sudan, Afghanistan, Iraq, in the past decade, and quite possibly and recently, Lebanon.

Donna (in an email on 26 Sept 2006) describes what will happen next week, "Outside the court, a Peace Convergence, made up of activists and supporters from all over Australia (and Ciaran O'Reilly coming direct from Ireland), will bring us back to the main issue: exposing Pine Gap and its role in the disastrous war in Iraq." -- but the real and pressing issue now is stopping the US from using Pine Gap to attack Iran -- this time they might be targeting Iran with nuclear bombs directed from Pine Gap.

HALLIBURTON AMBUSH IN IRAQ CAUGHT ON VIDEO

21 September, 2006

Halliburton Watch has obtained the first video of an ambush against a Halliburton convoy in Iraq that resulted in the deaths of three truckers who worked for the company's KBR subsidiary. The video, shot on Sept. 20, 2005 by KBR truck driver Preston Wheeler, shows what initially appears to be a routine convoy of sixteen-wheeler trucks delivering supplies to U.S. troops.



...Suddenly, a bomb explodes and a bullet hole is seen in Wheeler's windshield. "God damn, IED on the left side!" he reports to the military on the radio, referring to improvised explosive devices (IEDs) that have claimed hundreds of American lives. Small arms fire is heard again. "Jesus Christ!" Wheeler cries. "Help us all, Lord!" The video vividly demonstrates that KBR employees were literally left for dead by US military forces. HALLIBURTON IGNORED DANGERS, DRIVERS SAY

NoWar KBR CAMPAIGN

Halliburton, KBR, South Australia and Iraq



Strong threads tie South Australia to the invasion and occupation of a country thousands of miles away whose people have never done us any harm. We all know that the invasion of Iraq wasn't about WMD's, or terrorism, or how bad Saddam Hussein was or any other of the threadbare excuses that have been exposed as barefaced lies. It was about the old stalwarts, money and power.

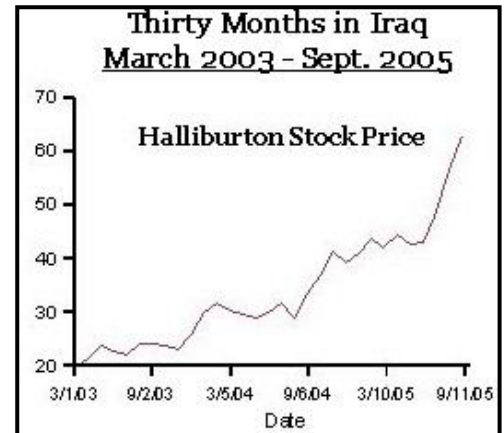
It's about the strategic importance of bases in the heart of the most economically important region of the world, now and into the future (up to 14 permanent US bases are being built in Iraq), especially as the oil gets scarcer and much more expensive. And it's about the profits to be made from that oil, and from the other assets of the Iraqi people, such as water and their own (cheap) labour.

One of the greatest beneficiaries of this carve-up is the US company, Halliburton, which provides oil and gas drilling, construction and military support to the occupying forces. The CEO of Halliburton, until he was (supposedly) elected to office was the Vice-President of the US, Dick Cheney. He is still a major shareholder, holding \$45 million worth. A major foundation of Halliburton's rapid growth in the 1990's was the global contacts Cheney made as Secretary of Defence under George Bush Senior.

The 85-year history of the company includes a series of major questions about its industrial practices and war profiteering, especially during the Vietnam War. But back to Iraq - the Pentagon didn't even go through the figleaf of tendering when it awarded a subsidiary of the corporation a A\$11.5 billion contract to clean up Iraq's oil industry. Talk about a conflict of interest! Cheney denied he knew about this and other contacts in advance, but a Pentagon memo has shown that to be yet another lie, as the contacts were "co-ordinated" with the White House.

A Halliburton subsidiary is Kellogg, Brown and Root (KBR). And where is KBR's global infrastructure division? Right here in Adelaide. And they have their grubby fingers in lots of pies. KBR has reported positively to the Federal Government on their nuclear dump plans for South Australia. KBR was heavily involved in the building of the Alice Springs to Darwin Railway, and remains a major shareholder. And we now know that the US government wants to build a so-called training base, most likely in the Northern Territory, and both the Australian government and the so-called Opposition support these plans. We also know that the South Australian government touts this as the Defence Industry state. So you can connect the final dots.

Halliburton also provides logistical support to the US military in Iraq and globally. Its contracts in Iraq are worth 3 times those of its next biggest rival, the Bechtel Corporation. Halliburton made A\$6.4 billion from such contracts in 2003 (its most profitable year to date). Halliburton pays Iraqis A\$246 a month, South Asian imported workers A\$500 a month, and US workers A\$13,500 a month for equivalent work. This includes overtime and hazard pay. The so-called "war on terrorism" has led to a huge increase in Halliburton activities providing military and construction support to the US armed forces, including in Afghanistan. It is also heavily involved with oil and gas infrastructure work via contracts with some of the world's most repressive military and autocratic regimes, such as those in Burma, Kazakhstan, Colombia and Nigeria. Halliburton is far from unique, but it is one of the best (or worst!) examples of what the invasion and occupation of Iraq and the whole "war on terrorism" is really about.



The fuzzy lines between big business and government are being further blurred, and corporations like Halliburton will profit from oil and war, war and oil – and the misery of millions of people robbed of one and killed and injured by the other. Having a part of this global robber-baron based in Parkside, Adelaide provides us with a unique opportunity to protest at and draw attention to its blood-soaked activities around the world. Look out for notices of a future demonstration outside KBR's offices – and join us to say "NO" to the profiteers of blood and misery!*

Sometimes people ask us what we spend our money on, and fair enough too, since much of what we have is provided through donations or membership subscriptions. What is NoWar?

NoWar is a South Australian peace group originally formed at the time of the invasion of Afghanistan in 2001. We oppose the idea that a military response to terrorism ("The War on Terror") can succeed or that its cost to innocent people could be justified.

We organized protests against the invasion of Iraq, including the biggest protest in the history of South Australia on 16 February 2003, when 100,000 people filled the streets of Adelaide. We opposed the war on Iraq because it was unnecessary, unjust and illegal. Iraq had not attacked anybody nor threatened to do so, nor had the capacity to do so.

Since the invasion of Iraq in March 2003, NoWar has continued its work of raising public awareness about the aftermath of the invasion, both for Iraq and the world. Unlike our government, we believe it is important that the public is made aware of the costs and reality of war. Unlike most of the mass media our interest in the war on Iraq did not diminish once the US and its allies launched their aggression.

NoWar opposes American militarism and unilateralism being the guiding forces in international relations. We support a more just world with peaceful resolution of conflicts, where acknowledgement is given to genuine grievances and our common future is not just about American political, military and economic interests. We support an independent foreign policy for our country and we want to see Australian troops only being used for the defense of Australia. NoWar continues to work for peace through public meetings, hosting visiting speakers, screening important films and holding public protests.

The aims of NoWar are:

To educate, inform and mobilise people based on the following principles:

- Opposition to the increasing militarisation of the world, and the consequences for the international community;
- Support for a reversal of the global military build-up, specifically the removal of nuclear, chemical and biological weapons, an end to the trade in arms, and a reduction in the current level of conventional arms;
- Support for the removal of foreign military bases around the world, and an end to foreign military interventions;
- Support for the resolution of conflicts in a just and peaceful manner, having regard for the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, international law and the rights of all peoples to self-determination.

NoWar consists of a Committee, a financial membership that elects the Committee (see below) and a large support base, the names of which we have collected over time at our various functions and events. From this membership and support base come people such as you, who become involved in our public meetings, rallies and other public actions towards peace.

The Committee meets every 2nd and 4th Wednesday of the month. The Committee has met approximately every 2 weeks for the last 3 years (with a short Christmas break each year!). Prior to that, particularly in the build up to the war, the Committee and membership met more than that, as many of you would remember!

During the height of anti-war activities, NoWar maintained a staffed office. Currently, the meetings are held at NoWar Committee member's homes.

Ways we communicate

NoWar has a policy that, except in special circumstances agreed to by the Committee, we only send out emails related to NoWar matters and concerns. In this way we hope to keep email traffic to a minimum. Most emails you will receive from NoWar will be about upcoming events or notices about meetings – and now this newsletter. Very occasionally we may forward an item generated by another group or about another matter.

Aside from emailing what we call our “data base” (the approximately 700 people who have given us their email addresses), there are a number of other ways that NoWar communicates with people. These are:

nowar_australia. This newsgroup was originally set up as is a communication and information forum for members who attended NoWar Committee meetings.
